Gospel Reflection – 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

One of the most touching YouTube videos I've ever seen is one in which a deaf woman receives new technology to heal her hearing. She hears her husband's voice for the first time — and her own, too — and bursts into tears of overwhelming joy. It must have been like an immovable wall between her and her loved ones came tumbling down.

We are all like this woman, to some degree. We believe in the presence of God's love, but we can't hear Him. We can't speak well about Him. The deaf man who can't speak properly in the Gospel today is an image of what God wants us to experience again and again. Jesus takes the man aside to a private place away from the crowd, touches his ears and tongue, and says, "Ephphata!" The man's ears are opened, and he speaks clearly. Contact with Christ has this effect on us.

This experience happens to us in our baptism, almost exactly. It happens to us in the liturgy. It happens in our private prayer. It happens when we hear the voice of God in our conscience. The more we engage these privileged channels of Jesus' healing, the more we are empowered to hear and speak of the presence of God's perfect love.

How to prepare for Mass well

Listen carefully to the Word of God: Maintain a receptive, meditative attitude that enlightens the heart and mind of every Christian because the Word is "living". By listening and through

personal recollection, it is possible to translate the Word into everyday life, receiving help and consolation.

Therefore, especially when standing up at the time of the proclamation of the Gospel, we are called to recognise the presence of the Lord who, through the minister, still speaks to us today in the Eucharistic celebration.

Welcoming the Eucharistic Jesus:

The broken bread becomes nourishment for the life and presence of God that strengthens and sustains us. It is necessary to experience this important moment with greater awareness in the certainty that the Lord enters each person's life and desires to be received into a

generous and attentive heart. As you approach Holy Communion, some silent prayers can be recited in your heart that will prepare you to receive the Lord with greater awareness and gratitude.



Social Justice Week 2024 focus

Choose forgiveness, know peace / Kōwhiria te murunga hara, kia mōhio ki te rangimārie.

Reflection Guide:

Te Āhua o te Puka Aratohu The first and last sections of the guide explore the concepts of forgiveness and reconciliation from a Catholic, Māori, and social justice lens, equipping us to be peacemakers. The middle five sections consider the steps in the process leading from wrongdoing to peace, considering each step in the light of a CST principle: • Opening our hearts and minds – through participation • Being willing to forgive – through human dignity • Asking for forgiveness – for the common good • Reconciliation – through solidarity • Building peace through reconciliation – and the principle of promotion of peace

The Lord's Prayer is one of the oldest Christian prayers, taught by Jesus in the Gospels. A key theme of the prayer is forgiveness – both asking for forgiveness from God and pledging to forgive others. Jesus made the ultimate sacrifice on the cross to forgive us our sins. Pope Francis discussed this in his Angelus address of 17 September 2023: "Forgiving is not, therefore, a good deed that we can [choose to] do or not do; forgiving is a fundamental condition for those who are Christians."
